President Eisenhower, Service to God and Country

“I like Ike!” For me, that is not only a great election slogan, but my real sentiment.

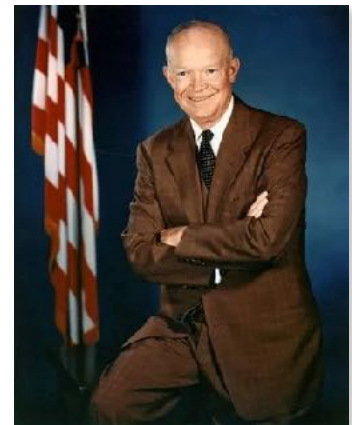
I even have an “I like Ike!” pin, a gift from my daughter and family who got to visit his Presidential Library in Kansas. I respect Eisenhower for his great leadership in World War II and fondly remember the good years our country had when he was President

Post WWII, Americans had seen and understood what the godless Nazi and Communist governments produced. In 1953, General Dwight D. Eisenhower became America’s 34th President. President Truman, Eisenhower’s predecessor and friend, had faced the beginnings of the Cold War and the rapid spread of Communism. Truman stated that Communism represented a conflict between atheism and Christianity. He felt that the only way to defeat the spread and influence of Communism was through Christianity. Ike wasted no time. He established the annual National Prayer Breakfast to gather world leaders in Washington to pray and hear a Christian message. He instituted an annual “National Day of Prayer.” “In God We Trust” was made the official motto of the nation and the phrase was added to our paper currency. Lastly, the Congressional Prayer Room was built in the US Capitol and featured a stained glass window of George Washington kneeling in prayer.

On February 7, 1954, Ike heard Presbyterian Rev. George Dockerty explain that there wasn’t much difference in our Pledge and the Russian Communist pledge. Dockerty said a fundamental concept that differentiates America from others wasn’t a political concept but a spiritual one. The pastor observed that Lincoln used the phrase “under God” often. Ike was inspired by the sermon and within four months by a unanimous vote of Congress, “Under God” was added to our Pledge.

During that period, numerous courts affirmed the importance of public religious acknowledgments, but all these Christian affirmations would not have happened but for Providence intervening in Dwight’s childhood. In 1903, he fell and skinned his knee. Within three days his whole leg was badly swollen and he couldn’t walk. Dr. Conklin said it was so infected it needed to be amputated to save his life. After his parents left the room with the doctor, Dwight made his older brother Edgar promise he wouldn’t let the doctor cut off his leg, so Ed blocked the door. Dwight’s fever climbed and he became delirious and the discoloration crawled up the leg, but Ed faithfully stood guard. The doctor said only a miracle would save him, so his family knelt at bedside and prayed night and day. Miraculously, Dwight fully recovered and kept his leg and could therefore enter West Point.

God had plans for Ike and his strong Christian faith and the prayers of his family preserved him to bless the world. His life was valuable, and, according to the Apostle Paul, each of us has something good to do in service to others. We might not save the world but there’s something we can do. *“For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them.” Ephesians 2:10 NASB*

Recent Events: May 2025 Meeting at Texas Port Ministry



The May 2025 BRW meeting was held at Texas Port Ministry in Freeport, Texas. The following article, written by BRW Associate Member and Texas Port Ministry Volunteer, Tom Stroschein, details the mission opportunities and services provided at Texas Port Ministry. Chris Moore, Director of TPM, gave a brief talk to the group of 37 BRW members followed by a tour of Port Freeport. Texas Port Ministry (TPM) attends to the spiritual, social and material needs of the seafarers, port workers and truck drivers at Port Freeport. The goal of TPM Director Chris Moore and volunteers is to reach out to every seafarer, truck driver and laborer that works or passes through each of the Port Freeport terminals and docks.

The ministry works as instructed in The Great Commission, “Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always to the very end of the ages” (Matthew 28:19-20).

We regularly reach out to every group, making connections with individuals to address their well-being, inquiring about their specific needs. It does not matter what country they are from, what language they speak, or whether they are Christian or non-Christian, we will help all in any way that we can. As TPM Director Chris Moore says, our duty as volunteers is to “show up and love people”. If allowed, we make Gospel presentations, say prayers and provide Bibles and Christian literature in their own language.

Our vans regularly take the seafarers to Lake Jackson to shop. Crew members who know they will be returning to Port Freeport can ship their packages here.

The ministry center offers Bibles, Christian literature, internet, coffee, cookies, restrooms and showers, a billiard table, air hockey, basketball, and movies. Truck drivers and others may use our center as a refuge for family members or co-workers who are traveling with them that cannot enter the secure areas of the port due to lack of credentials. We recently added a coffee trailer in the main truck parking lot to offer beverages and cookies, as well as Christian fellowship to the drivers and port workers. On Mondays we offer a lunchtime meal that is provided by a local church, an individual or business benefactor of TPM.

I have supported TPM for years and following my retirement from South Texas Project Electric Generating Station, I became a volunteer. I am motivated to serve because I believe we as Christians need to reach out to the world and provide help to those in need.

As a former U. S. Navy Officer, I know the challenges seafarers face—long, lonely periods at sea, limited communication with friends and family due to intermittent internet, and stints as long as nine months or more aboard ship.

I like to encourage Christian sailors to have Sunday service, as we did in the Navy; or start a bible study with other crew members. For non-Christians, I ask them to open their heart to accepting Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior; for those that do, we ask them to complete a decision card that allows us to mentor them in their journey of following Christ and the Gospel.

LEGISLATIVE CORNER: The 89th Legislative Session

The 89th Texas Legislature, which convened from January 14 to June 2, 2025, passed over 1,300 bills and joint resolutions. The following is an accounting of some of the priorities that came out of our 2024 Republican Party of Texas Convention and were acted upon by the Senate and House in the 89th Legislative Session. Governor Abbott has called a Special Session to begin on July 21, 2025.

— School Choice (SB-2 & HB-2): Establishes an Education Savings Account (ESA) program to support private school vouchers for those who qualify and allocates \$8.5 billion for public schools.

— Stricter Bail Laws (SJR-5): A proposed constitutional amendment allowing courts to deny bail for serious felony offenses will appear on the November 4, 2025 ballot. SB-9 gives prosecutors the ability to appeal bad bail decisions and ensures only elected judges may reduce the amount or conditions of a bail set by an elected judge.

— Water Infrastructure (SB-7 & HR-7): Dedicated funding of \$1 billion per year for the next 20 years will be on the November 2025 ballot as a proposed constitutional amendment.

— Religion in Schools (SB-10 & SB-11): SB-10 requires that every public school classroom display the Ten Commandments in a visible place. SB-11 protects the freedom to pray in public schools.

— Property Tax Cuts (SB-4 & SB-23): If passed at the ballot box in November, the state's homestead exemption will increase from \$100,000 to \$140,000 and homeowners over 65 are to receive a \$200,000 exemption.

— Border Security (SB-8 & SB-36): Requires county law enforcement to comply with the federal government's deportation efforts and establishes a homeland security division within the Texas Department of Public Safety.

— Texas is Not for Sale (SB-17): Prohibits the purchase of Texas land by foreign adversaries (China, Iran, North Korea and Russia), addressing national security concerns.

— Power Grid Reliability (SB-6 & SB-75): Addresses grid reliability by setting directives for large load consumers in the ERCOT region to prevent outages. SB-75 creates the Texas Grid Security Commission.

— Gender-Related Legislation (HB-229) Defines "man" and "woman" as the only two sexes.

— Ban on "Red Flag Law" Enforcement (SB-1362): Courts cannot temporarily remove firearms from individuals based on perceived threats rather than criminal convictions.

— Local Interest Legislation: HB-227 Designates FM 521 as the Clarence "BB" Sasser Medal of Honor Highway; HB-1729 Creates term limits for commissioners of Port Freeport; HJR-98 allows application of Article V of the US Constitution to call a convention of states; and SB-1426 names West Columbia as the "First State Capitol Historic Site". Governor Abbott Announces Special Session Agenda

On July 9, 2025, Governor Greg Abbott issued a [proclamation](#) identifying 18 agenda items for the upcoming Special Session that begins at 12:00 PM on Monday, July 21.

"We delivered on historic legislation in the 89th Regular Legislative Session that will benefit Texans for generations to come," said Governor Abbott. "There is more work to be done, particularly in the aftermath of the devastating floods in the Texas Hill Country. We must ensure better preparation for such events in the future."

The 18 Special Session agenda items include:

FLOOD WARNING SYSTEMS: Legislation to improve early warning systems and other preparedness infrastructure in flood-prone areas throughout Texas.

FLOOD EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS: Legislation to strengthen emergency communications and other response infrastructure in flood-prone areas throughout Texas.

RELIEF FUNDING FOR HILL COUNTRY FLOODS: Legislation to provide relief funding for response to and recovery from the storms which began in early July 2025, including local match funding for jurisdictions eligible for FEMA public assistance.

NATURAL DISASTER PREPARATION & RECOVERY: Legislation to evaluate and streamline rules and regulations to speed preparedness for and recovery from natural disasters.

ELIMINATE STAAR TEST: Legislation to eliminate the STAAR test and replace it with effective tools to assess student progress and ensure school district accountability.

CUT PROPERTY TAXES: Legislation reducing the property tax burden on Texans and legislation imposing spending limits on entities authorized to impose property taxes.

PROTECT CHILDREN FROM THC: Legislation making it a crime to provide hemp-derived products to children under 21 years of age.

REGULATE HEMP-DERIVED PRODUCTS : Legislation to comprehensively regulate hemp-derived products, including limiting potency, restricting synthetically modified compounds, and establishing enforcement mechanisms, all without banning a lawful agricultural commodity.

PROTECT UNBORN CHILDREN: Legislation further protecting unborn children and their mothers from the harm of abortion.

BAN TAXPAYER-FUNDED LOBBYING: Legislation prohibiting taxpayer-funded lobbying, including the use of tax dollars to hire lobbyists and payment of tax dollars to associations that lobby the Legislature.

PROTECT HUMAN TRAFFICKING VICTIMS: Legislation, similar to Senate Bill No. 1278 from the 89th Legislature, Regular Session, that protects victims of human trafficking from criminal liability for non-violent acts closely tied to their own victimization.

POLICE PERSONNEL RECORDS: Legislation that protects law enforcement officers from public disclosure of unsubstantiated complaints in personnel files.

PROTECT WOMEN'S SPACES: Legislation protecting women's privacy in sex-segregated spaces.

ATTORNEY GENERAL ELECTION POWERS: Legislation proposing a constitutional amendment allowing the Attorney General to prosecute state election crimes.

REDISTRICTING: Legislation that provides a revised congressional redistricting plan in light of constitutional concerns raised by the U.S. Department of Justice.

TITLE THEFT & DEED FRAUD: Legislation, similar to Senate Bill No. 648 from the 89th Legislature, Regular Session, that provides strengthened protections against title theft and deed fraud.

WATER PROJECT INCENTIVES: Legislation, similar to Senate Bill No. 1253 from the 89th Legislature, Regular Session, that authorizes political subdivisions to reduce impact fees for builders who include water conservation and efficiency measures.

STATE JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT: Legislation, similar to Senate Bill No. 2878 from the 89th Legislature, Regular Session, relating to the operation and administration of the Judicial Department of state government.

The Republican Pyramid

To effectively carry out the work of the Republican Party, it is essential to understand how it is structured and organized. The Party operates as a pyramid with three primary columns: Elected Officials, Executive Committees, and Conventions. The foundation of this structure is grassroots volunteers. This "bottom-up" approach ensures that everything the Party does begins with these volunteers, who ascend to serve in various roles within the three columns.

The Elected Officials column, located on the left side of the pyramid, grows when everyday Republicans step up to run for local offices. These local officials include City Council and School Board members, as well as

countywide positions such as County Clerk, Sheriff, and County Commissioners. Moving up the pyramid, the next level in this column comprises district-wide offices, including State Representative, State Senator, and District Court of Appeals. The subsequent level consists of statewide officeholders, such as the Governor and Lieutenant Governor. At the pinnacle of this column are federal offices, including Congress, U.S. Senate, President, and Vice President.

On the right side of the pyramid is the Conventions column. Local and State Republican Conventions are held every two years in even-numbered years, while the Republican National Convention (RNC) occurs every four years, following the State Convention and preceding each presidential election. All conventions are scheduled in a specific sequence as prescribed by law, with the work produced at each convention passed up to the next level. Anyone who votes in the Republican Party Primary is eligible to participate as a delegate in their local Precinct Convention and can apply to serve as a delegate at the Senatorial District and State Conventions, and can eventually run to be a delegate to the National Convention. A primary goal of the convention process is to develop the Republican Party Platform, which begins with resolutions submitted at the Precinct Convention level.

The final column of the Republican pyramid is the Executive Committees column, located in the center. Executive Committees serve as the governing arm of the Party, tasked with managing the Republican Party's business. These committees, at the local, state, and national levels, are responsible for organizing the grassroots, recruiting and registering voters, educating the public, getting Republicans elected to office, and promoting the passage of conservative legislation.

At the local level, each County Executive Committee (CEC) is led by a County Chair and includes one Republican Precinct Chair from each voting precinct in the county. The County Chair and Precinct Chairs are elected by Republican primary voters every two years or may be appointed by the current CEC if an office needs to be filled between primary elections.

The State Republican Executive Committee (SREC) oversees the business of the Republican Party of Texas between conventions. It consists of a State Chair, Vice Chair, and one Committeeman and one Committeewoman from each of Texas's 31 Senatorial Districts—all elected at the State Convention every two years. The Republican National Committee (RNC) includes a three-person delegation from each state: the State Chair, National Committeeman, and National Committeewoman, all elected at the State Convention every four years. The RNC itself elects its Chair and Co-Chair.

Whether you serve as a TFRW club member, a grassroots activist, a convention delegate, a County Judge, or an SREC member, it takes ALL Republicans working together to move the Party forward and advance our conservative agenda. Thank you for everything you do!

The following update, written by Rob, provides insight to the activities and improvements occurring at Port Freeport, an economically vital part of our community.*

This year will mark the 100th anniversary of the creation of the Port Freeport navigation district, and we have a lot to celebrate at YOUR port.

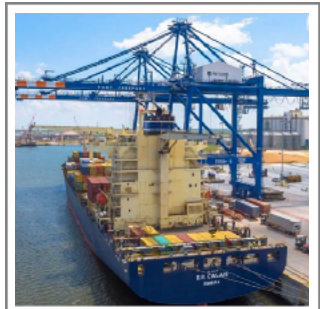
Last year we finally reached the goal of ZERO property tax, and in 2023 we eliminated the practice of giving part-time commissioners the same health benefits as full-time employees. Most recently, we asked our legislators to pass a bill to put a limit of two six-year terms on commissioners, and the Governor signed it into law on May 29.

We are on pace to once again set new records for both revenue and the number of ship calls to the Port. I am often asked about the impact of tariffs, but so far we have seen little to no effect, though that may change going forward.

We welcomed two new tenants last year – Volkswagen and Fresh Del Monte, resulting in an increase of about 250 to 300 well-paying jobs. (Fresh Del Monte is a separate company from Del Monte Foods which recently filed for bankruptcy, so that will have no effect on us.)

Looking forward, we continue to build for the future. Our channel improvement project is on track to be completed by early next year – on time and under budget. This will provide us with the deepest channel of any port in Texas, and will pay dividends for generations to come. Our two new ship-to-shore gantry cranes will arrive in September and will help continue our growth in container volume and support our local economy. Other infrastructure projects such as new warehouse space, expanded areas for cargo, and road improvements will allow us to efficiently move goods and expand opportunities.

The future is bright at Freeport, and I believe the next 100 years will be even better than the last!
